

UGANDA UPDATE

Transformative Change in Uganda: A Year of Progress

Dear Church Family, As I reflect on my recent trip to Uganda, I am filled with joy and gratitude for the remarkable changes I witnessed in the village since my first visit a year ago.

Thanks to your generous support and the collective efforts of our community, we are making a lasting impact on the lives of the villagers. One of the most significant improvements is the accessibility of clean water. The community has embraced the new well, and I observed villagers and members of the outside community gathering there daily. This vital resource has not only improved their health but also fostered a sense of unity as they work together to maintain it.

In the classrooms, I was thrilled to see new desks for the students, which have made learning more comfortable and engaging. The 200 children are now receiving better nutrition, with meals transitioning from corn mash to rice—an essential upgrade in their diet that promotes their growth and well-being.

A particularly proud moment for our partnership was the graduation of the first class from the technical school. We celebrated three skilled welders, six talented hair stylists, and nine dedicated seamstresses who are now equipped to support themselves and positively contribute to their community. These graduates are a testament to the transformative power of education, and I met with the local bank who is setting up small business loans for the women to use their skills to make money for their families to be fed and clothed. A great addition to the village.

Through your donations of vitamins, each child is now receiving a vitamin supplement once a week, which is crucial for their health. We are also seeing a decline in malaria cases, thanks to the mosquito nets provided to the families. Clean water, nutritious food, and preventive measures are paving the way for a healthier future. Our Christmas campaign raised an incredible \$2,000 in loose change, which funded essential medicine and a three-day health clinic for the entire community. Your kindness has brought healing and hope to many.

As we look to the future, our primary goal this year is to purchase six acres of land that will allow the village to create a sustainable community within the next five years. Currently, neighboring land is available for purchase, with an acre costing \$5,000. This land will enable them to cultivate crops for food and cash, ultimately leading to self-sufficiency. Most importantly, it will provide permanent housing for the 30 orphans who have found refuge at the school.

Let us continue to make a difference in Uganda! I encourage you to save your spare change and consider grabbing a change collection box from the table outside the office door. Every coin counts, and together we can change lives. Thank you for your past and continued support. Your generosity is transforming Uganda, and I am excited to see what God has in store for this community as we work together to create a brighter future.


